



Bridgewater Is Part Of A Wildlife Corridor

Please Take It Slow

Wildlife are on the move in Bridgewater. Sections of our town have been identified as part of a wildlife corridor that stretches from the Hudson Valley to Canada. As global temperatures rise, many species are heading north in search of cooler temperatures. The regional Follow The Forest initiative (followtheforest.org) has mapped and analyzed these active corridors and strives to reconnect woodlands, fields, and wetlands, to support migrating wildlife. The Bridgewater Land Trust is one of many local conservation organizations supporting this critical initiative.

Caution Advised

Locally, we have identified two areas that are heavily traveled and pose a danger to local wildlife. On Route 133 when heading toward Brookfield and just before the intersection of Stuart Road East, there is an open field on the right where many animals have been hit by vehicles. This is an area that is part of the identified corridor.

On Rt. 67 heading towards Roxbury and just after the intersection of Curtis Road, there is an undeveloped wooded area on the left and an apple orchard on the right. This is another location where there have been multiple strikes.

In general, there is wildlife everywhere in Bridgewater. Please drive with caution especially at dawn and into the early morning, and dusk when the animals are most active.

Check Out The Town Line Farm Trail


Tappen Brook Trails on University of CT Site

Like birds? Check out the Merlin Bird App


The app, developed by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, is a free mobile application that

allows users to instantly record the sounds around them and the birds are quickly identified. It uses a combination of user input, photo recognition, and sound analysis to assist birders of all levels.


