A community-based land trust is a non-profit organization that acquires and holds land for the benefit of a specific community. The Bridgewater Land trust certainly does that and much more. Beyond the traditional mission of an active land trust, we have expanded our role to enrich the town we all love.

In our "community" role, we connect people to the land by offering organized hikes, 5K races, and various outdoor experiences. We promote local farms, sponsor and manage enrichment programs for students, and offer nature-themed events and presentations. We enthusiastically participate in town affairs including the Tractor Parade, Trunk or Treat, roadside cleanups, and we even light up a giant Fraser fir for all to enjoy over the holidays.



Town Line Farm Trail Expansion

In Partnership with the Roxbury Land Trust

A newly built bridge now connects our Town Line Farm Preserve to a series of trails owned and maintained by the Roxbury Land Trust, thus expanding hiking opportunities and access points for the public. A Region 12 Supervised Agricultural Experience Connecting AgriScience Students To Farms

The Shepaug AgriScience Academy is starting its 6th year and has become an integral part of

Region 12. Students enrolled in the Academy, are required to log 150 hours per year doing what is known as a "Supervised Agricultural Experience". The main goal is for students to learn by doing, and to provide them with career ready practices. The BWLT was pleased to connect Ryan Marks, an Agriscience student from Newtown, with Stuart Family Farm who hired Ryan for the summer. Ryan, pictured on the left with Bill Stuart Jr., summarized his experience below.



I am Ryan Marks, a farm hand at Stuart Family Farm. I am currently enrolled at Shepaug Valley's Agriculture program, and the Ag-related skills and knowledge I learn are put to use on the farm. The Ag program teaches us information from equipment operation to animal handling and welfare, both of which I was able to use on the farm. From harvesting freshly laid eggs from the chicken coop to moving cows to new pastures to driving tractors and skid steers, I really enjoy helping out on the Stuart Family Farm.

Check Out The New Hemlock Loop Trail

The new Hemlock Forest Loop Trail is blazed and ready for hikers! The trail can be accessed at the intersection of Hemlock and Tappen Road. Look for the trail opening at the start of the dirt road there. A sign, map and pullover area are in the works.





The Fungus Among Us

Mushrooms can be fascinating. This impressive Chicken Of The Woods was spotted along the Tappen Brook 5K Trail. August and September are the best months for seeing a plethora of mushrooms in Connecticut.

What do "double blazes" mean?

Double blazes signify a turning point on a trail. The top blaze indicates which way the trail turns. In the example here, the blazes show that the trail bears to the left.



The Bridgewater Tractor Parade


The BWLT Will Host A Float

Metichawan

Bridgewater was home to Indigenous people for over 8,000 years. The Lover's Leap area near Lake Lillinonah Road North, was particularly active with tribes living along what was then the Housatonic River and now is Lake Lillinonah. In partnership with the Institute of American Indian Studies, we are offering a program on site that paints a picture of Indigenous life in our area. Many thanks to the Cipolla family for allowing us to gather outside of their home overlooking this historic area.
