## **New Farmland Acquired**

The Peardon Preserve


Our commitment to preserving Bridgewater's rural character was strengthened this week when the BWLT, with the support of generous contributions, acquired nine acres of pastureland and hayfields along Warner Road and Christian Street. This newly protected property connects directly to our Le Vaillant Preserve, creating a 25-acre greenway just one block from the town center. The purchase was made possible through the generosity of Bridgewater residents Christine Amorossi, Lynn Brinton and Dan Cohn, and an anonymous donor, also from Bridgewater.

At the heart of the property stands a historic English bank barn, its hand-hewn beams suggesting it was built in the early to mid-1800s. The farmhouse that once accompanied the barn was relocated by mule to Rocky Hill Road in 1937. Other notable features include hand-stacked stone walls, a tributary to Clapboard Oak Brook, mature sugar maples, and black birches—many well over a century old.

The preserve will be named The Peardon Preserve, honoring the family who owned the land for more than 100 years. The property will continue to be used primarily for farming, while we will also explore opportunities to expand the public trail network linked to the Le Vaillant Preserve.

Christine Amorossi shared her personal connection to the land: "I grew up riding horses here and working in the hayfields. I saw this as an opportunity to keep the land exactly the same. Protecting our rural landscape is important to me." Julie Stuart, Executive Director of BWLT, expressed her excitement: "We are very grateful to the donors who stepped up to help

preserve this land in perpetuity. Bridgewater residents have relished the iconic red barn and the horses grazing nearby for decades. We plan to maintain it with the utmost care." Christian Feuer, President of BWLT, emphasized its significance: "Keeping this piece of land as open space is important to the people of Bridgewater. Residents can continue to enjoy the rural views as they walk or drive by. It's classic Bridgewater—and it's why many people chose to live here."

## **Town Line Trail Expansion Complete**

#### New Trail Connects To Several Preserves

A newly built bridge and trail now connects our Town Line Farm Trail to a series of trails owned by the Roxbury Land Trust. The new white blazed trail is approximately 1/2 mile long. The trail leads to the bridge over Camp Brook and to an old logging road. From there hikers can access an expansive network of over 600 acres on four connected RLT Preserves: Erbacher, River Road, Golden Harvest and the Orzech Family Preserve. These trails include the old railroad bed along the Shepaug River.

### **Indigenous People Of Bridgewater**

Approximately 50 guests gathered at Indian Valley Farm in Bridgewater for an enriching program about the Indigenous peoples who once lived in the Lovers Leap area. We are especially grateful to the Cipolla family for welcoming us to their beautiful property, which offers sweeping views of Lake Lillinonah and Lovers Leap. Our heartfelt thanks also go to the staff of the Institute for American Indian Studies, whose presence and deep knowledge brought the stories of this place to life.



#### **New Pull Off Area**

A small parking area has been installed at our new Tappen Brook Preserve. It is located at the entry of the dirt road section where Tappen Road and Hemlock Road intersect. This makes a convenient entry point for guests to hike the new white trail or the upper section of the Tappen 5K course.





## **Dairy Barn Renovation**

Renovations on the south end of the Town Line Farm Preserve dairy barn are well underway. New siding, windows, and doors have been installed, the deck has been freshly stained, and the exterior has been fully primed and painted. Next, work will move indoors, where new insulation and wall panels will be installed.




## **Trunk Or Treat**
